Bertrand Badie is a Professor of International Relations at Sciences Po Paris and former vice-president of Executive Committee of the International Political Science Association (IPSA). **He is one of the most renowned French specialists in international relations**. He has published more than 25 books which have been translated into many languages. Professor Badie is a one of the general editors of The International Encyclopedia of Political Science. He is also a member of the advisory board of several journals: European Review of International Studies (Chairman), International Journal of Human Rights, Journal of International Relations, Etudes International of Law and International Affairs. Professor Badie has taught in many universities around the world: Universities of Lausanne, Geneva, Tunis, Rabat, Fès, Porto-Alegre, Bologna,...

Ambassador Janet Rogan (CEO at Royal African Society Foreign - RAS, Commonwealth & Development Office - COP26 Regional Ambassador for the Middle East and Africa) by Zoom



Her Excellency Ambassador Janet Rogan has recently taken up the position of CEO of the Royal African Society (RAS), based in London, which has a partnership with the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS). The Royal African Society's mandate is to improve understanding of Africa in the UK and beyond, and to increase interactions of all kinds. The Royal African Society (RAS) publishes the top-ranked academic journal, African Affairs, and an online news site, African Arguments, for voices from across the continent. This year, Africa Writes 2023 in partnership with the British Library, alternating annually with Film Africa in partnership with the British Film Institute. The Royal African Society (RAS) will be at COP28 and are developing a climate action and solutions programme. In March 2021, H.E. Ms. Janet Rogan was appointed as Regional Ambassador for the Middle East and Africa. She is an accomplished UK and UN diplomat with over 35 years of experience in Africa, the Middle East, the Balkans and China. She was the UK's climate ambassador for Africa and the Middle East, bringing a strong focus on implementation on the ground. She has wide policy, sustainable development, climate and humanitarian credentials and works extensively with governments, private sector and investors, civil society and youth. She joined the FCO (now FCDO) in 1986. She has worked with NATO (as UK Political Adviser) and the United Nations (as a UN Resident Coordinator). She has wide policy, development and humanitarian experience across post-conflict and fragile states, and in bringing the principles of the Sustainable Development Agenda 2030 and the global Climate Change Agreements together for wider strategic goals, including COP26.

Tanguy Struye de Swielande is professor in international relations at the Catholic University of Louvain (UCLouvain) and at the Royal Military Academy, where he teaches Geopolitics, International Relations Theories and Foreign Policy Analysis. He also coordinates the Baillet Latour Chair "European Union-China". Since September 2016, he is the Director of the "Centre d'Etude des Crises et des Conflits Internationaux" (CECRI). Professor Tanguy Struye de Swielande is the founder of "Genesys Network for Geopolitical Studies" and he is the co-founder of the "Réseau Multidisciplinaire d'Etudes Stratégiques". He also research fellow at "Egmont Royal Institute for International Relations".

His area of expertise: great power's relations, geopolitics, geoeconomy, foreign policy analysis, international relations, security and defense policy, new actors in international relations.

Jean-Pascal van Ypersele (UCLouvain, Former Vice Chair of the IPCC) on campus



Professor Jean-Pascal van Ypersele is a Belgian academic climatologist. He is a professor of Environmental Sciences at the Université Catholique de Louvain (UCLouvain). He is specialized in modelling climate and the climate effects of human activities, and has recently focused his research on climate change at the regional scale (modelling and impacts) and on integrated assessment of climate change. He chairs the Energy & Climate Working Group of

the Belgian Federal Council for Sustainable Development. In 2008, Jean-Pascal van Ypersele has been elected Vice-chair of IPCC (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, which shared with Al Gore the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize), after participating in its work since 1995. In that capacity, he led a reflection group on the future of IPCC, which proposed a number of reforms that were adopted by the IPCC Plenary in 2009. In 2009, he was elected a Member of the Belgian Royal Academy. He has participated to a number of United Nations conferences on climate issues as scientific advisor and was instrumental in creating in 2002 the UN work programme on climate communication and education. Among other prizes, he received in 2006 the « Energy and environment award » from the International Polar Foundation, the "Francqui Chair" from the Université libre de Bruxelles in 2007-2008, and was made Honorary Member of the Club of Rome EU Chapter in 2010. In 2011, he received the « Francqui Chair » form HUBrussel, co-organized the first Stephen Schneider Symposium, was made honorary citizen of the city of Dinant (Belgium), and received the highest distinction awarded by the Government of the Walloon Region: "Commandeur du Mérite wallon".



Jacques Rupnik is currently Research Professor at CERI-Sciences Po in Paris as well as visiting professor at the College of Europe in Bruges. Since he joined CERI, Sciences Po in 1982, he has been writing and lecturing about East and Central European history and politics and European integration. He was advisor to president Vaclav Havel in the 1990's. Executive director of the International Commission for the Balkans, Carnegie Endowment for International Peace (1995-1996) and drafter of its report Unfinished Peace (1996); member of the Independent International Commission on Kosovo (1999-2000) and co-drafter of The Kosovo Report (Oxford UP, 2000). Among the various positions held: advisor to the European Commission (2007-2010). Member of the board of the Institute for Historical Justice and Reconciliation in The Hague 2010-2017. Member of the board of directors of the European Partnership for Democracy in Brussels (2008-2013).

He has been a visiting Professor in several European universities and at Harvard. J.Rupnik's publications include *The Other Europe* (1989), *Le Printemps tchécoslovaque 1968* (1999), and, more recently, *1989 as a Political World Event: Democracy, Europe and the new international system*, with an introduction by V.Havel, London, Routledge, (2014), *Géopolitique de la démocratization*, *l'Europe et ses voisinages*, Presses de Sciences Po (2014), *Europe at the Crossraods: Democracy, neighbourhoods, migrations*, published by the Vaclav Havel Library, Prague, 2018, *Senzo il muro, l'Europa et il mondo dopo il crollo del communismo*, Rome, Donzelli, 2019.



The European Union's greatest success in the last twenty years remains the spread of its democratic model to the east of the continent. But the tectonic plates of the post-1989 era are shifting. Europe is rediscovering the (geo)political limits of law and democratization. Its soft power based on shared norms, on trade and on interdependence, is being challenged. Europe is undergoing a double destabilization: in the East, where Ukraine is struggling with Putin's Russia; in the South, where the collapse of states and chaos are following the Arab Spring. This brutal return of Realpolitik is bringing security, energy and migration issues to the forefront, forcing the EU to review its neighbourhood policy. If Europe wants to have a geopolitical influence on its neighbors, if its ambition is to be a "space Europe", more open to the outside world and better adapted to globalization, it must become a "power Europe", more political and more strategic. Written by the best specialists, this book invites us to rethink the relationship between the community project and its borders.

Frédéric Charillon (SciencePo, Paris, Royal United Services Institute - RUSI) on campus



Frédéric Charillon is a university professor of political science and a graduate of Sciences Po Paris. He has taught at the University of Clermont Auvergne (UCA), where he co-directed the International Careers master's program, and at ESSEC, where he is advisor on defense and diplomacy issues at the *"Institut de recherche et d'enseignement sur la négociation"* (IRENE). He also teaches at Sciences Po, in several foreign universities *"l'Université Euro-méditerranéenne de Fès"*, Morocco, where he is a member of the Scientific Council and is coordinator for international issues at ENA. He has been a senior associate member at *Saint Antony's College, Oxford*, and the *Royal United Services Institute* (RUSI), London. A member of the editorial board of several journals *"European Review of International Studies"*. His work focuses on the analysis of foreign action (foreign policy and defence). He has had a number of administrative experiences, in embassies, at the Ministry of Education and Higher Education. Co-founder of the Institut de Recherche Stratégique de l'Ecole Militaire (IRSEM, Ministry of Defense, France), he was its director from 2009 to 2015, after heading the Centre d'Études en Sciences Sociales de la Défense (C2SD, Ministry of Defense, France). He was a member of the *"Conseil National des 777Universités"* from 2011 to 2018 for the political science section.
