Bertrand Badie is a Professor of International Relations at Sciences Po Paris and former vice-president of Executive Committee of the International Political Science Association (IPSA). **He is one of the most renowned French specialists in international relations.** He has published more than 25 books which have been translated into many languages. Professor Badie is a one of the general editors of The International Encyclopedia of Political Science. He is also a member of the advisory board of several journals: European Review of International Studies (Chairman), International Journal of Human Rights, Journal of International Relations and Development, Contemporary Politics, Brazilian Journal of Strategy and International Relations, Etudes Internationales, Indian Journal of Law and International Affairs. Professor Badie has taught in many universities around the world: Universities of Lausanne, Geneva, Tunis, Rabat, Fès, Porto-Alegre, Bologna,...

Michael Cox (London School of Economics & Political Science –LSE, Director of IDEAS)



Professor Michael Cox is Director of [LSE IDEAS](#) (LSE's foreign Policy Think Tank). In a 2018 international survey, LSE IDEAS ranked number one university affiliated Think Tanks in the world. Professor Michael Cox is Emeritus professor of International Relations at [LSE](#) and guest professor at CERIS, since the early nineties. He has also held several senior professional positions in the field of international relations including chair of the European [Consortium for Political Research \(ECPR\)](#), member of the Executive Committee of the British International Studies Association and of The Irish National Committee for the Study of International Affairs. Since joining the LSE he has also acted as Academic Director of both the [LSE-PKU Summer School](#) and of the [Executive Summer School](#). In 2011, he launched a new Executive Masters in Global Strategy designed to teach senior foreign policy practitioners. He also serves on the editorial board of several academic journals and has been Editor of several leading journals in IR, including The Review of International Studies, International Relations, Cold War History, and International Politics. He is the author, editor and co-editor of over twenty books including US Foreign policy and democracy promotion: [US Foreign policy and democracy promotion: From Theodore Roosevelt to Barak Obama](#) (2013); [The Rise and Fall of the American Empire](#) (2012); [Us Foreign policy](#) (Oxford University Press, 2012). Professor Cox has spoken worldwide over the last twenty years to senior executives, business people, military and intelligence personnel and government organizations in Brussels, Beijing, Paris, Canberra, London, Rome, Madrid, Washington, Boston and New York. He has spoken on a range of contemporary global issues, with a special focus on US foreign policy, the state of Transatlantic relationship, the role of the United States in the international economy, the rise of Asia and the longer term problems facing the European Union.

Ambassador Janet Rogan (Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office - COP26 Regional Ambassador for the Middle East and Africa)



Janet was appointed as Regional Ambassador for the Middle East and Africa in March 2021. Janet joined the FCO (now FCDO) in 1986. She has served in the Far East, the Balkans, the Middle East, and Africa, and has worked with NATO (as UK Political Adviser) and the United Nations (as a UN Resident Coordinator). She has wide policy, development and humanitarian experience across post-conflict and fragile states, and in bringing the principles of the Sustainable Development Agenda 2030 and the global Climate Change Agreements together for wider strategic goals, including COP26. The Foreign Secretary has appointed four Regional Ambassadors for the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP26), which will be hosted by the UK in Glasgow on 1-12 November 2021. The COP26 Regional Ambassador for Middle East and Africa works closely with the COP26 Unit, the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office, and other stakeholders to help develop regional and country level support for our COP26 objectives. The Regional Ambassador helps ensure the delivery of COP26 objectives is central to our bilateral and wider regional relationships with governments, business and wider society.

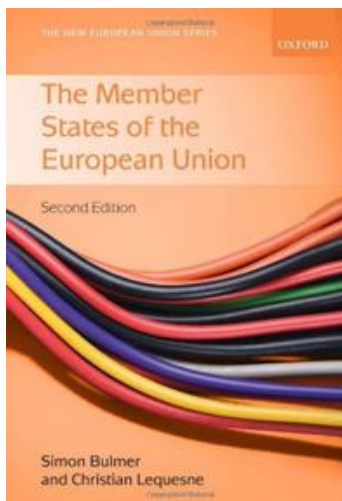

Christian Lequesne (SciencesPo-Paris, CERI)



Christian Lequesne is professor of political science at Sciences Po's Center for International Studies (CERI), where he specializes in European Studies and Diplomacy. He participates in the ESRC project "The UK in a changing Europe" and is Sciences Po's principal investigator within the H2020 EU-LISTCO project on European foreign policy. Research fellow and then Professor at Sciences Po since 1988, he was deputy director of

CERI from 2000 to 2003, and director of CERI from 2009 to 2013. Director of the Centre français de recherche en sciences sociales (CEFRES) in Prague from 2004 to 2006, LSE-Sciences Po Alliance. Professor at the European Institute of the London School of Economics from 2006 to 2008, member and vice-president of the Board of Directors of Sciences Po from 2007 to 2013. He is a regular visiting professor at the School of Government of LUISS University and the Diplomatic Academy in Vienna. Co-Founder and Co-Chief Editor with Prof. Christopher Hill (Cambridge) of *European Review of International Studies* (Brill), member of the international advisory board of *The Hague Journal of Diplomacy*, *Journal of European Integration*; *Politique européenne*. Member of the evaluation committee of the European Research Council (ERC) in 2017 ; member of scientific councils of the Finnish Institute of International Affairs. Regular columnist in the daily newspaper *Ouest France*. Was awarded the F. Palacky social sciences medal by the Czech Academy of Sciences and Chevalier in the Ordre des Palmes académiques.

Riccardo Petrella (UCLouvain, College of Europe-Bruges, Director IERPE)



Professor Riccardo Petrella is the *Initiator and former president of the Lisbon Group*. He is an Italian political analyst and economist. Honorary professor at the Catholic University of Louvain-La-Neuve and at the Europa College Bruges, he has taught in many universities around the world. Mr. Petrella worked for the European Commission as supervisor of the *FAST-programme (Forecasting and Assessment in Science and Technology)*. He was a senior researcher in the International Council of Social Sciences in Paris (France) and also a fellow of the Ford Foundation. Before that he was secretary-general of the Italian committee for the development of social sciences and *director of the European Center for Research in Social Sciences of UNESCO* in Vienna. In the 90s he published a trilogy, the last book being *Water Manifesto*, that defends the universal rights to access water sources. Professor Riccardo Petrella is the *director of the "Institut Européen de Recherche sur la Politique de l'Eau-IERPE"*. Professor Riccardo Petrella was nominated doctor honoris causa at the University of Umeå, University of Roskilde, Catholic University Brussels, the University of Mons, the Polytechnical Institute of Grenoble and the University of Québec in Montréal. He has been working as a visiting professor and afterwards as a full professor in economics at the University of Louvain, where he taught particularly global economics. Since 2006 he attained the status of professor emeritus. He was also visiting professor at the VUB (Free University of Brussels) from 1999 till 2005, and lectured on human ecology at the Accademia di Architettura de Mendrisio (Switzerland).

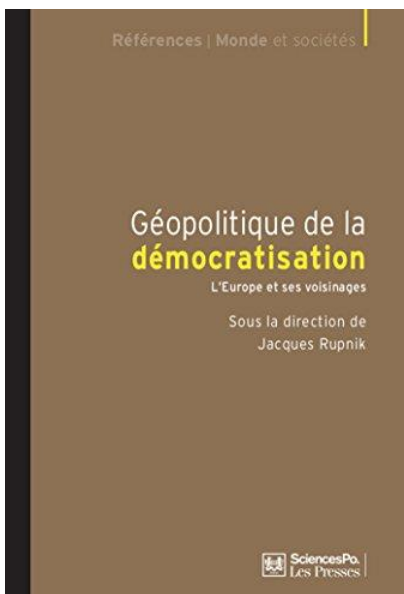

Jacques Rupnik (Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Paris-IEP, CERI, Visiting Harvard University)

Jacques Rupnik is currently Research Professor at CERI-Sciences Po in Paris as well as visiting professor at the College of Europe in Bruges. Since he joined CERI, Sciences Po in 1982, he has been writing and lecturing about East and Central European history and politics and European integration. He was advisor to president Vaclav Havel in the 1990's. Executive director of the International Commission for the Balkans, Carnegie Endowment for International Peace (1995-1996) and drafter of its report *Unfinished Peace* (1996); member of the Independent International Commission on Kosovo (1999-2000) and co-drafter of *The Kosovo Report* (Oxford UP, 2000). Among the various positions held: advisor to the European Commission (2007– 2010). Member of the board of the Institute for Historical Justice and Reconciliation in The Hague 2010-2017. Member of the board of directors of the European Partnership for

Democracy in Brussels (2008-2013). He has been a visiting Professor in several European universities and at Harvard. J.Rupnik's publications include *The Other Europe* (1989), *Le Printemps tchécoslovaque 1968* (1999), and, more recently, *1989 as a Political World Event: Democracy, Europe and the new international system*, with an introduction by V.Havel, London, Routledge, (2014), *Géopolitique de la démocratisation, l'Europe et ses voisinages*, Presses de Sciences Po (2014), *Europe at the Crossroads: Democracy, neighbourhoods, migrations*, published by the Vaclav Havel Library, Prague, 2018, *Senzo il muro, l'Europa et il mondo dopo il crollo del comunismo*, Rome, Donzelli, 2019.



The European Union's greatest success in the last twenty years remains the spread of its democratic model to the east of the continent. But the tectonic plates of the post-1989 era are shifting. Europe is rediscovering the (geo)political limits of law and democratization. Its soft power based on shared norms, on trade and on interdependence, is being challenged. Europe is undergoing a double destabilization: in the East, where Ukraine is struggling with Putin's Russia; in the South, where the collapse of states and chaos are following the Arab Spring. This brutal return of Realpolitik is bringing security, energy and migration issues to the forefront, forcing the EU to review its neighbourhood policy. If Europe wants to have a geopolitical influence on its neighbors, if its ambition is to be a "space Europe", more open to the outside world and better adapted to globalization, it must become a "power Europe", more political and more strategic. Written by the best specialists, this book invites us to rethink the relationship between the community project and its borders.

Murat Arsel (Erasmus University-Rotterdam, ISS-Den Haag)



Professor Murat Arsel is Lecturer in Environment and Sustainable Development at the International Institute of Social Studies (ISS), of the Erasmus University in Rotterdam. His research interests lie broadly in the areas of political economy and social theory, particularly regarding the interface between capitalism and nature-society relationships in rapidly developing societies. In this perspective, his work focuses on natural resource management and sustainable rural development in rapidly industrializing nations in the Middle East (especially Turkey) and Central Asia. Murat Arsel is the author of *Water, Environmental Security and Sustainable Rural Development: Conflict and Cooperation in Central Eurasia* (Routledge, 2009), *Environmentalism in Turkey: Between Democracy and Development?* (Ashgate, 2005), *Reflexive developmentalism?
